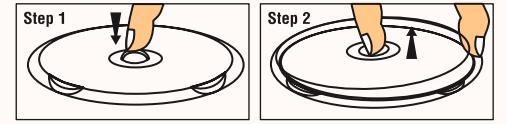

By the late 1890s, Western Australia's goldfields were a lure for ambitious young men from all parts of the globe. One adventurer was a 23-year-old American, Herbert Hoover, the future 31st President of the USA.

Working on behalf of London's Bewick Moreing & Company, he helped pioneer one of the richest gold mines in Australian history - the Sons of Gwalia at Leonora. Intent on minimising costs and maximising profits, he engaged Italian miners on contract. Most came from Italy's northern provinces. Like Hoover, they were young men seeking new prospects in a land of "red dust, black flies and white heat". Many found an early grave, with accident and disease taking a terrible toll. In 1934, long after Hoover had left the scene, ever-simmering anti-foreigner sentiment reached boiling point in Kalgoorlie-Boulder's infamous riots. In HOOVER'S GOLD, old and new worlds collide. It is a tale of triumph and tragedy, of ambition and shattered dreams - the legacy of which reverberates today.
